However, with one prestigious event now confirmed for April, I can finally bring you up to date with what we have planned for the early part of 2009.

## 18 April - 'Routemaster Day'

We have celebrated RTLs and Craven RTs and now it is the turn of the Routemaster. Some of you will know, and many more have heard, of Colin Curtis. He spent 40 years in a variety of roles at London Transport, and his name is synonymous with the design of the Routemaster. Latterly he is President of The London Bus Preservation Trust (Cobham Bus Museum). Colin has kindly agreed to speak to us about the development and history of the Routemaster, and this will be supplemented with some archive film.

Of course there will be rides on Routemasters as well, so we will pick up as usual in Central London and transport you to our base for the day, the London Transport Museum and Depot at Acton Town, where there is a splendid collection of vehicles, including RMs 1 and 2 and FRM1. There will be guided tours of the depot, and after his presentation Colin will make his way to RM1 and happily answer any questions on board you may have, so you can point to a bit of the bus and ask him about it!

Now if this wasn't incentive enough to come, we will be bringing the Routemaster story up to date. You will know of Mayor Boris Johnson's recent competition to design a 21st Century Routemaster. Boris is yet to confirm his attendance (!) but the Chief Designer from one of the winners of the competition will be coming along to tell us all about the modern version - the design constraints, the challenges they faced, and what's needed now to get it built and on the road.

On top of all this, we are hoping to arrange a garage visit as well.

The cost of the day will be £20, and that includes a buffet lunch at Acton.

What else have we got planned?

### 7/8 March

I'm really hoping to kick off our 2009 programme with a trip over this weekend. However, I still haven't got confirmation from the host, but I'll update you as soon as I can.
